This year is off to a busy start off the field. There have been many STEM, Science Oly and general kids sessions to kick it off and keep everyone busy. It's also what makes us thrive.


And some MMM congratulations in order!

HEADS UP: !!!!

In the unlikely event that a model lands within the fenced-in area of a ConocoPhillips well site, we are **not** allowed inside that area. Don't even think of jumping the fence to retrieve the model. Instead, call the number posted on the sign at the well site, and read them the name and description of the well site location. The well-site operator will come to retrieve the model--they're usually "on-call." If you can't reach anyone, call Mr. Max Blair's cell phone, 720-862-4503. It's possible they might not be able to retrieve the model until the next business day. Again, do **not** enter the fenced-in area - our lease could be at stake.

Motorcycle Use on the Field Policy:

Follow the roads wherever possible and not to follow the planes cross-country. Take the shortest path possible to the plane in order to retrieve it. Avoid riding through noxious weeds.

Subject: Hall of Fame Nomination for Don DeLoach

I am entering a nomination for Don DeLoach to be inducted into the NFFS Hall of Fame.

I have had the pleasure of knowing and flying with Don for many years. Based on my personal observations, I believe he is an outstanding candidate for membership in the NFFS Hall of Fame. I will explain the three reasons why I believe this to be true.

When Don arrived in Colorado the Magnificent Mountain Men club in 2000 was seen as being one that is focused on FAI events and the AMA and NFFS events were of lesser importance. This single focus by the club was not something that was pulling people into the club as could be seen by the fact that the club's championship contest was drawing 20 or so contestants. Now we draw over 50.

Don saw this as an opportunity to apply his marketing skills to lead the club into a positive growth phase by expanding the club's focus to include all phases of free flight. First he worked within the club as an active member and flyer always pointing to helping the club grow. These efforts came to the forefront when he was elected to serve as my vice president in 2003 and then president in 2004. Don's focus was one of inclusiveness. He wanted everybody who enjoyed any phase of free flight to feel welcome in the MMM club. This paid off in enhanced marketing of the club's events and growth in membership.

The second reason I support Don's induction into the NFFS HOF is his championship performance on the flying field. Don holds the senior P-30 record that was set in 1990 with his original design the Pole Cat. This same design was a NFFS model of the year in 2005. In addition to this Senior P-30 record he is the holder of the Senior helicopter record six Senior indoor records. As an open competitor he has set five outdoor records, all with models of his own design.

On the flying field Don is a serious competitor who wins a lot of events and meet championships. His most recent was the meet champion at the 2014 Southwestern Regionals in Eloy Az. Even when he is flying many events in a day, he takes time to help others. An example of this was when I won F1G at the Eloy contest. My best model was broken and I was about to simply pack it up when Don came over and helped me repair it and win the contest.

Don is also a scale modeler of renown. He has been awarded the FAC Blue max award and in the most recent FAC Nationals he won the over all championships in both scale and non-scale categories. This accomplishment is a first in the history of the FAC.

He is a designer of renown. Designs such as the Super Talon and Pearl gas ships of several sizes have been kitted and supplied to many competitors. His P-30 design, the Pole Cat was the NFFS Model of the Year in 2006. This is the same basic design he used to set the current senior record in 1990. His E-36 design, the Super Pearl 202E was the NFFS model of the year in 2013 and has won many contests and is the current open record holder. This record was set by Linda Powell in 2013.

The third reason I believe Don is worthy of being a member of the NFFS HOF is his contributions to the hobby. Don is an active CD here in the MMM Club and runs the annual three day Rocky Mountain FF champs. In addition he has served as president and vice president of the club. He served on the NFFS Model of the Year committee and is currently serving on the hall of fame committee. (no, he won't have the opportunity to vote on his nomination as Gary will keep it from him)

If anybody takes a look at the current full color NFFS Digest you will see Don's work in leading this publication. Under his leadership, the NFFS Digest has become the world standard in free flight journalism.

So there you have it. I am submitting Don's name for consideration for the HOF because of his leadership on the local level in our club, as a champion competitor, and a contributor to the over-all free flight community.

Hello Karen and Kimberly (City Auditorium).

When we met with you we closed that meeting with a request for a reduction in the rental rate we are paying to use the City Auditorium. We based that request on the fact that our use of that facility is in times that it is normally idle and our activity is such that we make little demands on the center's staff. We went on to discuss how we are involved in the early introduction to STEM to the youth of the area. Our involvement ranges from elementary school students up to high school students involved in the Science Olympiad program. In 2013 we presented programs like this at the WWII Aviation Museum, Ft Carson Middle School, and the Science Olympiad at UCCS. In addition we were coaches for a student program at the USAFA.

The club's ability to support these STEM programs is depend upon our ability to have access to good flying sites so that we can keep our skills polished as well as development of additional programs.

At the end of our meeting in your office we were told that there might be a way to reduce the rental cost of the City Auditorium is we could bring our STEM program to a Community Center.

After the meeting I visited the Hill Side center and found that its gym was an acceptable venue for such a program.

I contacted Ms. Clemons and she arranged for us to be able to use that facility on Monday December 30 to present our entry level STEM program to a group of students there at no charge to the MMM Club. We did incur the cost of the models which was approximately \$40.

The objectives of the program was for the students to have fun with simple entry level model airplanes and to be able to explain the four forces acting on an airplane in flight. We had expected 5 or 6 students but were greeted with 16.

The program started with an explanation of who we are and what they will be doing while in the session. We started by dividing the group into three smaller groups and each student in each group had the opportunity to fly one of john McGrath's models. The objective of this session was to give the students real hands on experience with handling the models and to experience a successful flight.

Next we moved to a class room type of discussion where the students were ask to talk about their experience with the models they had

just flown. Then we went into a discussion of the four forces on an airplane in flight, Thrust vs. drag and lift vs. weight

At the end of the class room discussion model airplane kits were given to each student and with the help of the club team (Bill Leppard, John McGrath, and myself) the students assembled their models and the flying session started. Again the group was divided into three smaller groups and each team member worked with their group to help the students obtain successful flights. This phase was a lot of fun for everybody as the room was filled with flying airplanes and happy laughing students.

Once all the airplanes were flying we had a competition where all the models were launched at the same time and the last one down was the winner.

The session ended with a discussion of the kind of jobs that are available in the aviation segment and why STEM is an important path to these jobs.

With this program completed can we return to the discussion of a reduced rental fee for our use of the City Auditorium? If you feel that an additional session would be of a benefit we might be able run this program again during the Spring Break time frame. We would like to not be committed to sessions during the summer months as our team members will be traveling to model meets around the country.
